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**Drawing conclusions** means figuring something out for yourself. To draw conclusions, you need to think about what *makes the most sense*.

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Here are some examples of things you can figure out for yourself. Put an X in the box for the **conclusion** that *makes the most sense*.

1. Adam's dad turned on the hose and sprayed the car with water. He filled a bucket with more water and some soap. He brought out two big sponges and handed one to Adam. This is probably because:

- They are going to water the grass.
- They are going to play in the water.
- They are going to wash the car.

2. Mr. Carter is pushing a rolling cart filled with books. All around the room there are shelves filled with more books. One by one, Mr. Carter puts books from the cart on the shelves.

This is probably because:

Mr. Carter is a grocer.

Mr. Carter is a librarian.

Mr. Carter is a doctor.

3. The bird hopped around on the grass. It picked up a piece of string and carried it up into a tree. It flew back down and picked up a twig to carry it up into the tree. All morning, the bird carried twigs and bits of paper and string up into the tree.

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4. Leo and his dad went to the boat dock. They put their fishing gear into the boat. Leo got into the boat while his dad untied the rope that held the boat to the dock. Then Leo's dad got into the boat and sat down.
